Minutes of the Board Meeting for Mar. 23rd. 2010

Opening:

The club President, Bill Grove, formally opened the meeting for business at 7.01 p.m. at the Central Point Senior Center. There were seven members present.

Meeting Minutes:

The Secretary read the minutes of the March 9th general meeting. There were no questions or comments, so a motion was moved, seconded and approved to accept the minutes as read.

OLD BUSINESS

Float Fly events.

Bill announced that he had the Insurance papers and Sanction documents for both Agate Lake and Selmac Float Fly events. Also the notifications and Flyers have been sent to multiple clubs in a 250 mile radius. Bill is looking for a working phone number for the Young Marines.

Possible Control Line Circles.

Bill and Gary had a meeting with Tom Styers our contact at the County for discussion of the possible installation of two Control Line circles. Tom seems quite enthusiastic on the idea and may provide a grader at no cost. This is under consideration

Park Flyer runway and new Taxiway/Runway project

Gary Neal described the progress so far in the improvements to the Park Flyer runway . The trenches have been dug and work continues. There is a major working party organized for tomorrow to help with the project.

Field maintenance.

Gary, plus some other stalwart club members have been out spraying the field for weed control. Also the Safety Fence repairs were completed for a total expenditure of \$59. That is well below the \$200 that was budgeted.

Bill described how he had persuaded Soilworks to provide a free five gallons of Soiltac. (They originally wanted us to pay). They also mistakenly sent a one litre bottle. So now we have a total of ten gallons plus one liter of liquids for the surface preparation.

Bill has tried hard, but still can't find a source of dye at a reasonable price. There was a discussion on dyes. Bill will continue looking.

There was a discussion on the piping that Gary Croucher is seeking for the racing pylons

NEW BUSINESS

Bill has received information and a batch of raffle tickets from the US Scale team Manager. This is to provide financial support for the U.S. FAI team going to Poland for the World Scale Championships. R/C and Control Line. The prizes that can be won are very attractive. Bill will bring these tickets to the next General meeting.

John James suggested replacing the current pilot safety fencing with the individual semi-circular type.

Bill stated that old Pylon Racing Trailer is falling apart and in terrible shape. Someone has offered to haul it away at no charge. After a short discussion, a motion was moved , seconded and approved to have the trailer removed.

Gary talked about the parking area and the work that would need to be done to effect a permanently stable surface that would not require maintenance every year. Gary will continue to work up a cost estimate for this work

There was also a general discussion on resurfacing or replacement of the main runway. This was left in abeyance for future attention.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:02 p.m.

RX Battery Pack Problems - In the latest issue of MA was an article by Ed McCollough the AMA Insider Technical Editor who cited potential problems using a 4.8V receiver battery with the new 2.4GHz radios. He suggests that flyers of .40 to .60 size airplanes use a 6.0V (5 cell) pack. He said, "The extra voltage offers a measure of protection that can well prevent the radio from seeing a low-voltage condition.

"Even though an appropriate-capacity 4.8V battery pack may be adequate, if a four cell pack loses one cell and/or drains quickly, it can show that dangerous low-voltage point sooner than a 6.0V pack."
